Carefully cautious Gerald and spirited playful Piggie share a day where anything is possible in an imaginative exploration of the meaning of friendship. The comedic duo addresses such important questions as, What do you wear to a fancy pool costume party? Should you share your ice cream? And how can two friends play with one toy? Together with nutty back-up singers The Squirrelles, our duo even gets the audience involved in the action. Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!" is a perfect way to introduce young people to theatre.



The Main Man Mo

Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!" would not have been possible without the magical, miraculous, marvelous and magnificent Mo Willems. Willems' work in children's books, animation, television and theater have garnered him three Caldecott Honors, two Geisel Medals, six Emmy Awards, five Geisel Honors and a Helen Hayes nomination. He is best known for his characters *Knuffle Bunny*, *The Pigeon* and *Elephant and Piggie*. He has also worked in television as a writer and animator for PBS's *Sesame Street*, Cartoon Network's *Sheep in the Big City* and Nickelodeon's *The Off-Beats*. Willems also makes sculptures and writes plays, including the rollicking musical romp *Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!"*

Willems's *Elephant & Piggie* books debuted in 2007 with *Today I Will Fly!* and *My Friend is Sad*. Today a total of 25 books surround the friendship of this comedic duo. These books are the fuel and inspiration for the musical, which directly features seven of the most popular books of the series.

The Theater

Long Island Children’s Museum Theater is the only theater on Long Island presenting performances specifically for family audiences on a year-round basis. It has presented vibrant and engaging performances for families since the Museum opened in 1993 and plays a central role in the range of educational experiences provided to visitors. In 2008, the LICM Theater expanded its role and began producing professional level family theater shows. Scripts are selected that encourage audience interaction and create personal experiences that we hope children will take with them throughout their lives.


Show Time!

Before the Show:

- Please do not bring food or beverages into the Theater (bottled water is permitted).
- Please turn off or silence cell phones when entering the Theater. This makes the experience more enjoyable for everyone.

During the Show:

- LICM Theater is a place that encourages audience interaction in most of our shows. However, we ask that the audience remain seated until prompted by the actors to enter the stage area or respond to questions.
- Keep the aisles clear as per fire safety regulations and in case of emergency.
- We know that young children are curious and will want to ask you questions during the performance—feel free to talk quietly with your children.



- The use of recording and/or photographic equipment is strictly prohibited. You will have an opportunity to take photos of our performers and chat with them at the end of every show.

After the Show:

- Stay and meet the performers!

Making Connections

Activity Time: Broken? Fix It!

Have you ever accidentally broken someone else's toy? Make your way to our Truth Booth and confess a time you broke someone else's toy, or a toy of your own. How did you feel when you broke that toy?



Question Quest! How did you feel walking into the Truth Booth? How did you feel walking out of the Truth Booth? Has someone ever broken a toy of yours by accident? How did it make you feel? Did you forgive them? If so, why?

Activity Time: Sound Showers

Play with musical instruments like Piggie and her trumpet. Piggie plays her trumpet to sound like an elephant. Can you find any other instruments that sound like animals?

Question Quest! What is your favorite song? How does that song make you feel? How many spoons can you find in this gallery?

Literary Link: Sergei Prokofiev's **Peter and the Wolf** is a classic symphonic fairy tale in which a narrator tells the children's story while an orchestra illustrates it using musical instruments that sound like animals. Listen to the creative classical music while you read along with the narration.



Activity Time: TotSpot

Visit the ice cream truck in the back of the gallery to scoop ice cream like Penguin. Stack as many scoops of ice cream on your cone as you can and then see if you can share your ice cream with others, like Gerald and Piggie do with each other.

Question Quest! What is your favorite ice cream flavor? How many flavors of ice cream are in this gallery? How many forms of transportation can you find in this gallery?
