Long Island Children's Museum Named Corporate Beneficiary

Not-for-profit organizations depend on community support to keep them running and the Marcum Workplace Challenge has put this reality at the heart of its philanthropic outreach. Bringing together leading companies, organizations and government agencies from across Long Island to field running teams to support the region's charities, the Marcum Workplace Challenge has raised over \$930,000 for race beneficiaries. Long Island Children's Museum joins Children's Medical Fund of New York, Long Island Cares: The Harry Chapin Food Bank, and the Nassau County Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals as 2019 beneficiaries.
